An investment in quality programming

Proposal balances costs with expanded opportunities, results in estimated 1.95% tax rate increase

On May 21, Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake School District residents will go to the polls to vote on a proposed \$69.55 million budget for the 2019-20 school year. The proposal carries a 2.90 percent tax levy increase and results in an estimated 1.95 percent tax rate increase.

Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, May 21, at BH-BL High School.

Voters will also be asked to elect two candidates to the Board of Education (see pages 8-9) and consider a proposition to continue the district's practice to include an ex officio student member on the board.

The proposed budget preserves all current academic programs, includes expanded opportunities for students, and realizes cost savings through retirements and reallocation of staff responsibilities. The spending plan, which remains below the district's tax levy cap of 3.76 percent for the seventh year in a row, also supports the district's commitment to improve instructional technology districtwide and create 21st-century learning spaces.

"As outlined in the district's 21st-century Frameworks for Learning guiding principles. we remain committed to offering engaging and personal educational experiences while providing our students and staff with the tools they need to learn and teach in today's technology-driven world," explains Superintendent Patrick McGrath.

State aid forecast

BH-BL is slated to receive an overall state foundation aid increase of \$101,045 or 0.75

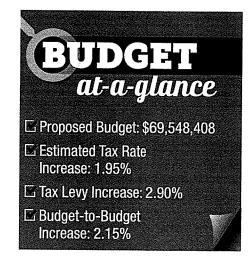
percent, which is the lowest increase the state provided to any school district for 2019-20. In fact, for the past few years the district's foundation aid increase has steadily declined and has not kept pace with the rate of inflation.

"A delicate balance of budget-neutral additions and planned use of fund balance over the past several years has allowed the board to adhere to its promise to deliver high-quality programming and services while remaining below the tax cap," says Superintendent McGrath. "However, when developing our long-range financial plan it's imperative we take into consideration the trends in our state aid because it is unlikely we will be able to continue to balance budgets this way."

The 2019-20 budget proposal, therefore, includes efforts aimed at generating additional revenue. One way is to continue expanding Distance Learning (DL) courses offered through the high school. The state reimburses the district for the costs associated with teaching DI courses. Another initiative is to broaden

the district's food service department through Spartan Catering and opening a Spartan Cafe. (See page 2 for details.)

"As the percentage of the district's budget supported by foundation aid decreases, we must be open to other revenue sources," says McGrath. "Ideas we've discussed are sharing our courses with other schools, developing a potential alumni funding partnership, and encouraging strategic, targeted economic growth of our tax base."

What's included in the 2019-20 proposed budget?

In addition to preserving low class sizes and current academic programming, the proposed budget also includes several opportunities to expand upon existing offerings and budget-neutral initiatives.

EXPANDED MATH ACADEMIC INTERVENTION SERVICES TO K-2

Academic Intervention Services (AIS) in math is currently offered to students in grades 3-5, but will be increased next school year to include grades K-2. The small group setting and instructional support will focus on helping students develop better math competency and improve their foundation skills, both of which are essential to learn higher level math concepts and become strong problem solvers and critical thinkers. As an example, students learn about money in the early elementary grades and then add to that math knowledge when they learn about percentages and fractions in later grades. "Students need to have a solid understanding of basic mathematical concepts before they can build upon these skills in later grades," explains K-12 Math Supervisor Bill McQuay.

EXPANDED DISTANCE LEARNING

Next year's budget further broadens the district's distance learning opportunities by continuing to participate in the BOCES Distance Learning Network. "Distance Learning allows us to leverage technology to bring students from other districts across our region into our classrooms," says McGrath. "When we do this, we receive additional aid to support the cost of the course. This is a win-win for us. It allows our students to take classes with students from other places, increases opportunities for students, and provides a revenue source for our district."

ADDITION OF GRADE 2 KEYBOARDING INSTRUCTION

The new state standards in English language arts include keyboarding instruction at the elementary level. During the second half of the school year a high school business teacher will go to the elementary schools to

provide formal keyboarding instruction to second-grade students. This includes lessons and practice of fundamental keyboarding skills that are necessary to operate a keyboard smoothly while typing. "Typing is a muscle-memory activity and when learned properly it becomes secondary to the task students are trying to accomplish," explains K-12 Business Supervisor Stephanie Andreicak. Keyboarding is also an essential lifelong skill. As part of the district's 1:1 Technology Initiative, students in grades 3-12 are assigned a Chromebook laptop they are expected to use during school for class work and projects. "We provide our students with technology tools so it's important that we also teach them how to properly use them," adds Andreicak.

NEW MANDARIN CHINESE IN GRADE 7

Mandarin Chinese, which is currently offered as an enrichment course in grade 6, will be added as a world language course option in seventh grade. And because Mandarin is already taught at the high school, middle school students will now be able to bridge their language studies to earn course credits to fulfill their world language graduation requirement. "Mandarin has become the second most popular dual-language education program in the United States," explains Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum & Instruction Maryellen Symer. "Adding Mandarin Chinese to our world language program supports our goal to prepare students for college and careers in a globalized world."

BROADENED FOOD SERVICE DEPT.

This proposal includes extending Spartan Catering to include service for in-house athletic banquets, club/ organization gatherings, take-out dinners, district meetings, workshops, etc. Also in the works is opening a Spartan Cafe at the high school. On select days the cafeteria would be open after school and early evening to sell snack bar food.

UPGRADED SAFETY & SECURITY

Within the past several years, there have been many changes to the schools' physical safety and security measures. Next year's budget proposal includes upgrades to these measures, including additional digital surveillance cameras throughout the district and the continuation of a single-point of entry at the elementary schools during after-school and early evening hours.

UPGRADES TO 21ST-CENTURY CLASSROOMS

The proposal supports the board's goal to continue modernizing classrooms to create 21st-century workspaces. Next school year, 45 classrooms will receive improvements to the infrastructure in order to support today's instructional technology, such as high-definition projectors, cameras, and touch screen monitors and tablets that students can use to interact with the screen from their desk.

TECHNOLOGY & LIGHTING UPGRADES & SAVINGS

Included in the budget is a commitment to use Category Two E-rate Funding along with BOCES aid to purchase local area network equipment (\$227,690) needed to upgrade the technology infrastructure at all three elementary schools. And because e-rate funding and BOCES aid will be used for this improvement project there will be little to no net impact on local funds. The project also includes \$25,000 per elementary school for cabling associated with the infrastructure upgrades. Also included is funding (\$100,000) for a capital outlay project for renovations that include upgrading to more energy efficient (LED) lighting in the Stevens gymnasium.

What happens if voters do not approve the proposed budget?

If the proposed budget is defeated, state law gives the Board of Education two options:

- * Resubmit the same or revised proposal for a revote or
- * Move directly to a contingent budget.

If voters defeat the proposal a second time, however, the board must adopt a contingent budget.

Rules more severe now

Under New York's tax cap law, districts that adopt a contingent budget cannot increase the current tax levy by any amount—resulting in a zero percent tax levy increase.

Bringing the BH-BL tax levy increase down to zero would force the board to reduce the proposed budget by \$1,160,278. In doing this, the board may not be able to adhere to its goal of preserving student

programs and services or staff. It would likely have to make a number of staff reductions across all schools, which would increase class sizes.

Adopting a contingent budget prohibits a district from spending any money in certain areas, including community use of school facilities (unless all costs are reimbursed to the district); new equipment purchases; nonessential maintenance; capital expenditures (except in emergencies); salary increases for non-instructional and non-unionized employees; and certain field trips and student supplies.

Also under contingency rules, the administrative component of the budget would be subject to certain restrictions. These requirements existed prior to the tax levy cap and remain in effect.

Is there another proposition on the ballot?

In addition to the first proposition, the 2019-20 school budget, residents will also be asked to vote on a second proposition reauthorizing an *ex officio* student member position on the BH-BL Board of Education. By law, residents must approve this proposition every two years.

This proposition was first proposed and approved in May 2015. For the past four years, a different high school student each school year has been appointed as an *ex officio* member.

The student member attends board meetings, sits at the board table, and contributes to public discussions. An *ex officio* student member does not vote and does not attend executive sessions.

"We are a better board because we have a student voice at the table," says Board President John Blowers. "For the past four years we've been able to more regularly integrate the student board member into our meetings allowing us to strengthen student-centricity in our decision making."

Impact of new real estate development in BH-BL

When new construction occurs within district boundaries in the form of residential and commercial development, BH-BL's tax base increases. Continued growth in the tax base allows a district's tax rate increase to be lower than the overall tax levy increase—as has been the case in BH-BL for the past several years.

The tax levy is the total amount that a school district collects each year in taxes from all property owners.

The tax rate is the amount of tax paid for each \$1,000 of assessed value of property.

The chart on the right shows the impact of a growing tax base over the past four school years and next year's projected tax levy increase and estimated average tax rate increase.

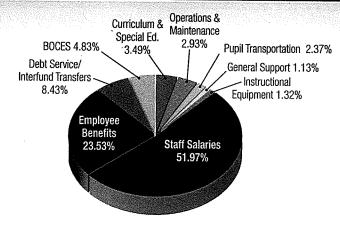

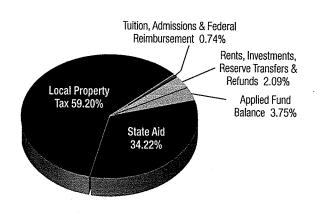

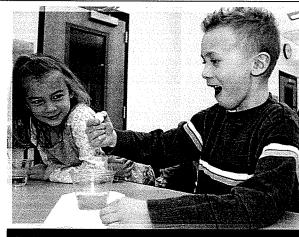

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2019-2020 by the qualified voters of the Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake Central School District, Saratoga & Schenectady Counties, New York, will be held at the Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake High School in said district on Tuesday, May 21, 2019 between the hours of 7 a.m. and 9 p.m., prevailing time in the Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake High School gymnasium, 88 Lakehill Rd., Burnt Hills at which time the polls will be open to vote by voting machine.

**BUDGET COMPONENTS DEFINITIONS

- Administrative costs include the salaries and benefits of administrators and supervisors, the salaries and benefits of clerical staff, school board costs, curriculum development, staff development, tax collection, legal and auditing costs, central printing, central data processing, general insurance, BOCES administrative costs, research, planning, and evaluation.
- Program costs include the salaries and benefits of all teachers and staff delivering pupil services (health, guidance, library, and athletics), textbooks, instructional materials, equipment, extracurricular activities, BOCES program costs, and all costs of the transportation program except bus purchases.
- Capital costs include the salaries and benefits of custodial staff, debt service, bus purchases, utilities, fire insurance, tax certiorari, and other court-ordered expenses.

The box on the left is the "School District Budget Notice" as required by state law. School districts must present their costs in three prescribed components, as defined below. A more detailed breakdown of expenses and revenues is given on page 4.

- * Assumptions made in projecting a contingent budget for 2019-20, should the proposed budget be defeated: While this may be adjusted, the district assumes the proposed budget would be reduced by removing noncontingent expenses for equipment and new capital project costs. To result in no tax levy increase as the law requires, we would also need to cut a number of staff positions and increase class sizes. (See page 3.)

Are new buses being purchased for next year?

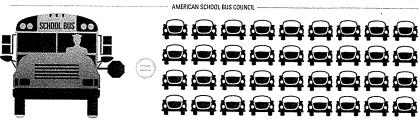
Yes, but like the past few years the cost of the new buses is included in the budget proposal. Bus purchases are done this way so the district doesn't have to borrow funds and incur debt. The proposed budget includes \$830,000 for the purchase

of five 66-passenger buses and three 29-passenger buses (one with a wheelchair lift) to replace some of the district's oldest buses.

The district anticipates being reimbursed approximately 66 percent of the cost of the buses through state transportation aid in subsequent years, resulting in a net local cost of approximately \$282,200.

Additionally, by purchasing buses outright, the district saves an estimated \$15,000 in interest and legal fees associated with borrowing funds.

Bus replacement plan

The buses scheduled to be replaced in the 2019-20 school year are among the oldest in the district's fleet and have already accumulated high mileage, exceeded their warranties, and undergone many maintenance repairs. Beyond certain limits, buses typically become too costly to maintain given the state's stringent safety codes. Furthermore, new school buses are aligned with the latest safety and

emissions standards and have better fuel economy rates.

BH-BL's 69-bus fleet travels more than 700,000 miles a year, transporting more than 3,100 students to and from its five schools. The buses are also used for sporting events, out-of-district runs, shared transportation runs, field trips, summer school, and other events.

In order to keep buses in safe working order, the district's longstanding policy has been to replace several of the oldest buses each year.

Are there any exemptions available to help taxpayers?

Yes. Homeowners can receive property tax exemptions under the School Tax Relief (STAR) program. Under state law, STAR exemptions can now grow by only 2 percent per year.

The Basic STAR exemption is available on a homeowner's primary residence for anyone who owns and lives in his/her own home and earns less than \$500,000 a year.

The Enhanced STAR exemption is available on the primary residence of taxpayers age 65 and older with yearly incomes of \$86,300 or less.

Other tax relief options

BH-BL residents over the age of 65 with incomes of \$37,400 or less also can be exempted from paying school taxes on 5 to 50 percent of their home's assessed value depending on their exact income. The district also grants a disability exemption, ranging from 5 to 50 percent, for qualifying residents of any age with disabilities and incomes of less than \$37,400.

Last year, the board adopted the Alternative Veterans' Tax Exemption at level 1, which allows qualifying veterans to be exempted from paying school taxes on a portion of their home's assessed value depending on their military service.

Applications for these district exemptions and for state STAR exemptions must be filed with your town assessor's office. Visit your town's website or call your town assessor if you have questions about these exemptions.

How will the proposed budget impact taxes?

The 2019-20 proposed budget of \$69,548,408 is 2.15 percent higher than the current year's budget. Given the state aid BH-BL will receive and other revenue sources, the overall property tax levy will increase 2.90 percent in order to balance the proposed budget.

Equalization rates

Calculating tax rate increases is complicated by the fact that the BH-BL district is made up of parts of four towns---Glenville, Charlton, Ballston Lake, and Clifton Park,

Each year, tax rate increases vary from town to town due to equalization rates that the New York State Office of Real Property Services (ORPS) announces in August.

As the name implies, equalization rates are intended to spread the tax burden across the four towns as fairly as possible. The rates attempt to "equalize" or compensate for differing assessment practices, for the fact that one town's assessments may be more recent than the other towns', and for

the fact that property values don't change equally in all towns within the school district.

For instance, if ORPS determines that property values have risen more in one town than another in the past year, the tax increase in that town may be somewhat higher than the estimated 1.95 percent average for 2019-20, while the rate in another town may be lower than the average.

Equalization rates are typically not shared with school districts until August. Equalization rate differences tend to even out over several years, but they make it impossible to predict actual tax rate increases in each town.

The school district plays no role in determining what portion of the tax burden is placed on any one town or any one property owner.

The state ORPS office sets equalization rates that determine the portion of the total tax levy paid by each town, and the assessor in each town calculates individual assessments that determine how much is paid by each property owner.

Understanding this infographic: If your home is in Glenville and last September's tax bill shows its total full-market value was \$193,258, your school tax bill could increase by \$78 in September. This is the best estimate the school district can make given existing data. Calculations will change when ORPS announces new equalization rates in August. Additionally, the estimated figures are before factoring in any exemptions. Reminder: Some town assessments are more up to date than others. Median full-market value figures are calculated directly from the tax rolls and are based not on the entire town, but only on the portion of each town within the BH-BL district.



Eighth grader Josh Warland makes sure the rocket box-style bat house he built in Nick Morocco's Technical Systems class properly fits on its anchor post. The class requested this project after learning that a large colony of endangered northern long-eared bats were discovered on teaching assistant Kelly Chila's Saratoga County property. In 2015 this species of bat was placed on the endangered list after discovering white-nosed syndrome is contributing to their extinction. According to the NYS Department of Environmental website, the disease is easily spread because bats hibernate together in massive colonies in caves and mines. The students' bat houses will help separate the bats when they aren't hibernating and

possibly slow the spread of the disease.

Understanding Tax Levy and Tax Rate

How is the tax levy different from the tax rate?

The tax levy is the total amount that a school district raises each year in taxes from all property owners.

The tax rate is the amount of tax paid for each \$1,000 of assessed value of property.

is the tax levy increase within the tax cap?

Yes. In fact, the proposed tax levy increase of 2.90 percent is below the district's 2019-20 maximum allowable tax levy limit of 3.76 percent. Staying below the tax levy limit allows residents to qualify for the state's property tax rebate.

How does the tax levy cap work?

Under New York State tax cap rules, school districts must use a complex formula to calculate their own unique "tax levy limit." Districts then add exclusions set forth in the law to this limit to determine their maximum allowable tax levy for a simple majority vote.

Board of Education CANDIDATES

At the polls on May 21, residents may also elect *two* members to the Board of Education.

"John Quincy Adams once said that 'If your actions inspire others to dream more, learn more, do more and become more, you are a leader.' Burnt Hills

All voters must be United States citizens, age 18 or older on election day, residents of the BH-BL school district for 30 days immediately prior to election day, and registered.

Registering to Vote

You are already registered to vote on May 21 if you are registered with your county Board of Elections to vote in a general election.

Absentee Ballots

Registered voters may vote by absentee ballot if they are unable to appear at the polling place on May 21. To receive an absentee ballot, first fill out an application from Clerk of the Board Dr. Christopher Abdoo at the district office. The application can also be downloaded from the BH-BL website at www.bhbl.org/budget/voting-information/

The completed application must be returned to Dr. Abdoo at least seven days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or at least one day before the election if the ballot is to be picked up personally by the voter at the district office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Absentee ballots will be counted only if they are returned to the clerk of the board no later than 5 p.m. on election day, May 21. 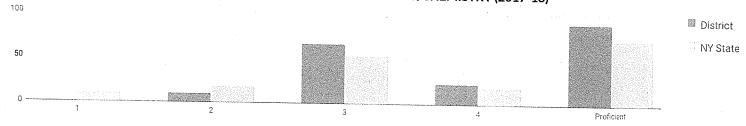
