



Third Grade School Supplies

Dear Third Grade Families,

I would like to welcome you and your child to third grade! We are starting our year with a virtual adventure! I am excited for this challenge and can't wait to meet all of you! Below you will find a supply list. Please keep in mind, as the year progresses, you may need to supplement additional supplies that are easily consumable. Please periodically check with your child to see how his/her supplies are holding up.

Class Supply List:

- ___ 1 pack of Crayola Classic Markers
- ___ 1 (12-24) count pack of Crayola Twistables
- ___ 1 pair of scissors
- ___ 2 jumbo glue sticks
- ___ 1 box of sharpened pencils-Ticonderoga preferred
- ___ 1 highlighter
- ___ Erasers
- ___ 1 red 2 pocket **poly** folder (no prongs needed)
- ___ 1 blue 2 pocket **poly** folder (no prongs needed)
- ___ 1 folder design of your choice
- ___ 1 large zipper pencil pouch or box
- ___ 1 pair of earphones/earbuds to use with a Chromebook
- ___ 1 notebook/composition book (regular rule)
- ___ 1 package of lined paper (wide ruled)
- ___ a supply of unlined white paper, 8.5 x 11 inches (for drawing, potential projects, scrap paper)
- ___ 9" x 12" whiteboard (doesn't need to be these exact dimensions, but something close)
- ___ several dry erase markers
- ___ an old sock to be used as an eraser (or you can purchase an eraser for the whiteboard)

Additional supplies needed for Art class:

- ___ 12 inch ruler
- ___ black fine-point Sharpie markers
- ___ pencil sharpener
- ___ colored pencils
- ___ thick and thin markers (feel free to use the pack of markers on the class supply list for one of these packs)
- ___ a large Ziploc bag to store these items

During virtual learning in the spring, many students found it helpful to identify a specific workspace at home. It should be in a quiet area, away from distractions. The student should have a table or desk to set the computer on and a comfortable seat. All your child's supplies should be in this designated area for easy access.

When third grade begins, students are expected to have fluency in addition and subtraction facts. Students should also be in the habit of reading for at least 20 minutes daily. Reading is the foundation to all subject areas.
